

Grouping Objectives

When designing your curriculum, curriculum designer breaks down the learning objectives by Year Group. However, you may wish to link specific objectives to each other, such as for a module or by half-term. This can help you to identify what you need to plan and when.

To group objectives – it is worth identifying the Key Performance Indicator of the group. What is the overall objective you wish to measure the students against? In this example, I am using the NAHT's curriculum for Maths at Key Stage 2. The KPIs are already identified, and here are a series of objectives to do with telling the time.

By clicking **Edit** in the top-right, I can alter the position of objectives using the drag-handles.

I'm going to move "*Estimate and read time*" onto "*Tells and writes the time*". Note how the shadow becomes dark grey. And when I drop the objective it too becomes dark grey and appears within the light-grey container of "*Tells and writes the time*". I can continue to add the Time objectives and even make some objectives children of other sub-objectives.

If I was moving an objective and dropped it inside another accidentally, I can un-do this by dragging it out of the current position and move it down and left slightly until the drop location changes.

One reason to group objectives is that you can then use the top learning locker to store resources and lesson plans. You may be teaching these group of objectives together any way and this way you can have a single bank of resources. Of course, each learning objective has its own learning locker so it's up to you.
